Get to know the school you are applying to!

Research the school. Visit the school's website.

What size school are you looking for small, medium, or larger?

Make sure it has the academic areas that you are interested in.

The financial costs of attending the school. What can you really afford?

The Common Application



Accepted by over 800 colleges and universities and opens August 1.



It helps and streamlines the college admissions process



Saves the student time without having to fill out multiple applications and visit many sites.

The Common Application

The common application will prompt you if the college you are looking at requires an essay or other information for review.

About 50 percent of the schools do not have fees. If a fee is required it must be paid or use a fee waiver if eligible. There is a deadline of January 1 for the Common Application by your time zone.

How is an admissions decision made?



<u>Quantitative</u> <u>formula</u>



- Test scores like ACT & SAT
- Honors courses
- Advance level courses AP & IB
- College/University Courses
- Class Rank unweighted & weighted

How is an admissions decision made?



<u>Qualitative</u> <u>factors</u>

- Essay (personal/suggested topics)
- Personal statements
- Interviews
- Recommendations
- Student Activities like clubs and athletics
- Achievements like National Honors Society
- Auditions & Career Shadowing hours

When do you apply to a college?



Before December 1 is highly recommended

It gives you the best chance of getting into the school and location of your choice and major of choice.

Some programs fill up faster than others which can change admissions standards for those programs.

When do you apply to a college?



Early consideration for some scholarships.

In many situations you can submit additional information later (don't wait too long)

Generally you have until May 1st to commit to the school of your choice.







The first thing colleges look at is the high school record. This will show a lot about where a student is academically and how they are challenging themselves.



The GPA & transcript is the biggest factor in most admissions decisions.

Review process: The Transcript & GPA

English 4 years

Social Studies 3-4 years

A strong college prep curriculum should have a mix of these subjects

Weighted and Advance level coursework

These courses will weight your GPA at many of the high schools and even assist the student in obtaining admissions to colleges.

Weighted and Advance level coursework

Honors courses

- AP courses (can count as college credits)
- IB courses (can count as college credits)
- Early to College programs with partnering schools
- Supplemental college courses in general

New Trends: Self-Reported Academic Record (SRAR)



Some universities and colleges, particularly larger schools, seek self-reported transcripts so that decisions can be made more efficiently.

The college might use these SRAR to see which applicants are eligible for programs sooner than waiting for the official transcript

New Trends: Self-Reported Academic Record (SRAR)

Some tips for the student to remember

- Report and enter grades & scores accurately as they appear
- Enter all final grades from 9 through 11. Include your current schedule as well
- Do not apply weight, average, or convert your grades to another format
- Enter the exact name of the course
- Use an actual transcript to assist you and still submit an official transcript

Review process: The Tests





Most colleges and universities are still using tests as a big part of the admissions decision process.



This factor can count as much as 50% of the evaluation process.



Begin the process and practice early by taking the PSAT in 10th and 11th grade.

Review process: The Tests

The **SAT** and **ACT** tests are used the most in the reviewing of college applications.

- Schools may super score your test if you have taken the same test multiple times. It is generally recommended you take them at least twice. Once in your junior year and again during your senior year.
- If you do take the test more than once make sure the test dates are months apart (minimum of 2-3) to allow you gather additional knowledge to increase your scores.
- Both the SAT and ACT are accepted by all institutions

Placement test

 The placement test allows universities to see where a student is currently at academically and collaborates their high school transcripts and current experiences with the decision making.



Placement test

Used with most students who have never taken the SAT/ACT while in high school. Those students include many non-traditional populations like...

Military personnel

Recent high school graduates of 2+ years

Returning adults of all ages



 Used primarily with international students and students here in the U.S. where the primary home language is not English. Accepted by most colleges.



Test-optional

Tailor made for students who have done well academically but struggle on tests for a variety of reasons (learning disability, English is second language, learning style, schools that de-emphasize testing)

Many colleges are being added to this list each year. The admissions team look more closely at everything you submit and your achievements.

Testoptional

- Some of the test optional schools become <u>test-flexible</u> and request additional information like
 - AP/IB exam results
 - Extra essays or additional letters of recommendations
 - Written/artistic/scientific/ portfolios
 - Even sit down for single-subject test



Determining the right test for your students is important. Many universities are exploring alternative forms of testing.



With so many different types of college entrance exams, it can be difficult to keep track on how they are scored, measured, and formatted.



Familiarize yourself with them and know your admissions friends and this will help you feel more comfortable.



Remember the tests do not define who your students are.



So many factors are required at many colleges and optional at others. Look at what the school is requesting from you to gain admissions. If you need it, then submit it on time. You can also submit it to other colleges who don't require it.



"Optional" then it is an "Opportunity" for you.



Essays

Just keep it simple and always answer the question.

Share something new that they don't already know. What makes you special?

Ask people who know you to produce a few compelling questions/topics about you.





Personal statements

Surmounting adversity are hard to pull off but if true then share it.

Bring the appropriate forms to the individuals.

With recommendations let your teachers, counselors, or any references know well in advance before actual due dates.

Meet and greet the individuals who will be doing this for you, so it becomes more of a personal recommendation or reference.



Submit everything that you feel may benefit your admissions to your Dream school. Many schools want to know what do you do outside of the academic environment. If you are an athlete, if you work part-time, if you volunteer at the animal shelter...let them know.

Review process: The Decisions

This is the toughest part...the wait!

- Most colleges try to give you a decision as quickly as possible.
- College admissions reps are traveling and reviewing files in the fall continuously.
- Be patient. If it seems to long give them a call and they will tell you what is going on.
- Believe me when I say we want you at our school as well.

Review Process: The Decisions

Establish and become familiar with your **student portal** as many schools will communicate with you primarily through the portal. Importation information is shared like...

- Admissions decisions
- Financial aid award letters
- Missing information
- Confirmation Instructions
- Scholarship notifications
- Student orientation dates
- Housing related information



Congratulations the student is admitted!

Review Process: The Decisions



Admitted but referred to another major or second choice major



The student is placed on hold for additional information

The student is placed on hold for additional information



- Request grades for marking periods
- Recommend new SAT/ACT scores
- Additional information

Review Process: The Decisions

- Recommended to a Summer Bridge/ACT 101 program
- Files can be reviewed again with newer updated info
- Student is denied (there still are options to get to your final destination)
